# **Good Farm Neighbors Dan and Lynn Bolin**

Butler County REC members but a ceremony on their Clarksville farm. Nominated by the board of Butler County Farm Bureau, the Bolins, the 176th neighbors honored, are the first award recipients in Butler County in the 19 years of honorees. Iowa Secretary of Agriculture Mike Naig was on hand to present the award.

The Wergin Good Farm Neighbor Award nominees must meet four criteria—family operation, active in their community, produce livestock or poultry to the highest animal care standards, and dedicated to conservation and/or environmental stewardship on their land. The award is made possible through a partnership with the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship and The Big Show on WHO Radio. Financial support comes from the Coalition to Support Iowa's Farmers.

The Coalition supports livestock farmers in several ways, including their Green Farmstead Partner Program through which they provide guidance to livestock farmers who want to grow trees for wind breaks. The Coalition gifted the Bolins a burr oak tree from a nursery in Vinton as part of their award.

Dan and Lynn moved back to the area to begin farming with Dan's parents, Dave and Pam, in 2011. In April of 2015, construction began on their barn. By December, the first cows were moved into the structure. The cattle are milked by a robotic milker, able to milk two cows at a time.

In January of 2020, Bolins opened New Day Dairy GuestBarn on their property for people to "sleep with the cows." The bed-and-breakfast offers two large windows in the loft area with views of the dairy barn and 150 cows. There are games, toys, and books inside the living quarters and outside there is a grill, a porch and patio, lawn games, and a garden.

Guests can venture off-property for adventures in the area such as biking, hiking, or exploring a fossil prairie. If guests choose, up to four people can participate in the "Be a Dairy Farmer Challenge" with Dan—ride in a tractor, go in the dairy barn with the cows, milk a cow, and learn how to move cows and take them into milk, among other farm duties. Participants each receive a tee shirt and a certificate signed by "Dairy Man Dan."

"Families are our main demographic. Lots of our guests are from the Minneapolis/St. Paul area and Des Moines. Mom bloggers have been a driver for our business," said Lynn. They have had guests from other countries, as well, and some guests have Googled "stay on a farm in Iowa" and found the GuestBarn.

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### **Deck your halls with LED lights – and earn a rebate**

It's the most wonderful time of the year and Butler County REC wants to make it even more wonderful!

When you buy LED holiday lights, fill out a form on our website at butlerrec.coop/rebates (or use the coupon in your November REC bill) and send it in with the lighting receipt. We will then add a \$2 per string credit (not to exceed purchase price) to your next bill. Purchase as many strands as you would like—there is no limit.

LED lights use less electricity than conventional bulbs, last up to 50,000 hours or more when used outdoors and twice as long indoors, and there is no chance of combustion because the bulbs are cool to the touch.

# Five Ways to Safeguard Your Home This Winter By Abby Berry, NRECA

As the temperatures drop and the days grow shorter, there's a natural inclination to create a warm and cozy home. Unfortunately, as we see increased use of heating equipment, candles, and electrical items, the number of home fires tends to increase during winter months.

Here are five ways you can safeguard your home for the winter season:

- 1. Ensure carbon monoxide and smoke detectors are working properly. Test the detectors once a month, and be sure to dust them. If battery-operated, replace the batteries annually.
- 2. Use space heaters safely. If you use portable space heaters, remember to keep them at least 3 feet away from flammable items. Use models that

include an auto shut-off feature and overheat protection. Use space heaters only to heat smaller spaces. Never plug a space heater into a power strip.

- **3.** Avoid overloading electrical outlets and power strips. When overloaded with electrical items, outlets and power strips can overheat and catch fire. If you use power strips for multiple devices, make sure the strip can handle the electrical load. Look for power strips that include surge protection. Also, before using any corded items, double check to make sure cords aren't frayed or cracked.
- 4. Clean the fireplace to improve safety and efficiency. As wood burns, a sticky substance known as creosote builds up in the chimney and can ignite a fire. The chimney should be cleaned at least once a year to reduce fire risks. Regular cleaning also improves air flow and limits the amount of carbon monoxide that seeps indoors.
- 5. Practice safety in the kitchen. As we spend more time in the kitchen during the holiday season, be mindful of potential fire hazards: never leave food unattended that is cooking on the stovetop, clean and remove spilled foods from cooking surfaces, and be careful of where you place flammable items like dish towels.
